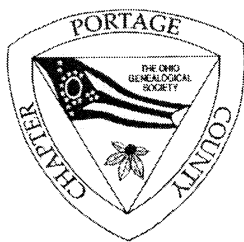

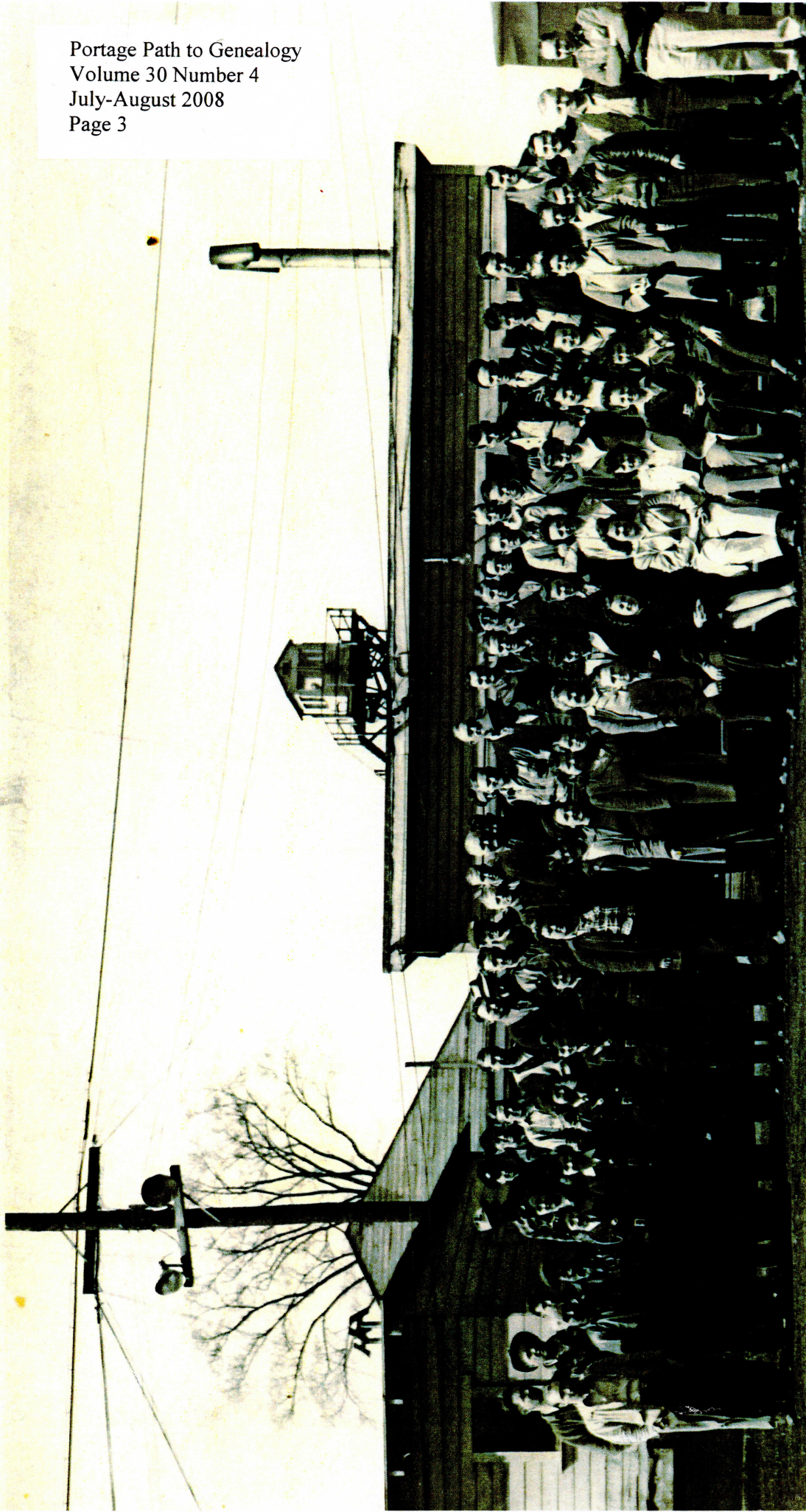

TIMEPIECE SAVES LIFE

**Deflects Tine of Pitchfork
Which Would Have Pen-
etrated Body.**

Lawrence Field of Edinburg, recently recovered from typhoid fever which caused the death of his wife and which has prostrated all of the remaining members of his family, had a marvelous escape Wednesday. While engaged at work at his home near Silver Creek one of his horses kicked at him, striking a pitchfork which he was holding in his hand and driving one of the tines against his side. Fortunately, the force of the blow was broken by his watch which he carried in his vest pocket or the consequences would doubtless have been much more serious and probably fatal. The case of the timepiece was dented so as to stop the watch.
