HISTORY OF THE DAVID AND MARY GRIFFITH FAMILY

This is the story of Welsh immigrants who came to America about 1861 for a better life. David Griffith was born in Carmarthanshire, Wales, Sept. 18, 1837 and came with his wife, Mary Davis Griffith to pursue their dreams. After residing in Coshocton and Hubbard, Ohio and Wampum, Pa., where David was a coal miner, they came to settle in Portage County, Ohio south of the village of Wayland.

Their farm was on the east side of Wayland Road, just south of Gilbert Road west, in Paris Township. It was there they raised 10 children. Two other children, Sarah and William, died as toddlers. The children attended a one-room schoolhouse near their farm with many discontinuing their formal education after 8th grade to work on the farm.

David was a member of Masonic Lodge #462 in Newton Falls, and the family worshipped at Wayland Baptist Church.

All ten of the children married. John, James, and Walter (my grandfather) bought farms in Paris Township. The eldest daughter, Edith, married Evan Davis and resided on Gilbert Road west. Mary Jane (Jenny) and Lillian married the Hawley brothers, Elmo and William respectively, with Lill and Will occupying land on McClintocksburg Road adjacent to Walter and his wife, Dora. Both Arthur and Judson worked for the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad while Ben became a pharmacist and stockbroker. The youngest, Roy, resided in Newton Falls where he served as postmaster and was elected mayor for three terms.

The children mourned the loss of their dear mother, Mary, in 1906. In September, 1911, the children and grandchildren held a big party to celebrate David's 74th birthday. That turned out to be the first Griffith-Davis Family Reunion. The last reunion, the 91st, was held in Howland, Ohio in August, 2010. They now meet every two years with members of the 4th through 7th generations attending. Many family members, including David, who lived to be 91, and Mary, are buried in Hawley Cemetery, Paris Township.

The descendents of David and Mary are proud of their Welsh heritage. David's brother, John, remained in Wales, and several members of David's family have been able to correspond with and visit John's descendents when traveling to Wales.

Within the rich history of Portage County, the David & Mary Griffith family has left a legacy of hard work, strong faith, and patriotism for their new country.

A PORTAGE COUNTY BOY.

Dr. G. W. Shepard now Assistant Surgeon in U.S. Navy with Rank of First Lieutenant.

One of Portage county's sons whose sphere of usefulness and influence is constantly widening and whose name is bound to be enrolled among those whom the nation delights to honor is Dr. George W. Shepard, until recently a resident of Rayenna. Dr. Shepard was born in Freedom in 1878, son of S. W. and Nettie F. (Hopkins) Shep-S. W. and Nettie F. (Hopkins) Shepard. He was reared in the country, surrounded by its rugged influences, and after the usual district school period entered the Garrettsville schools, from which he graduated with a class of fifteen members in 1896 with first honors. He then taught district school for two years, followed by a year at Hiram College. He by a year at Hiram College. He graduated from the Western Reserve Medical College in Cleveland in 1903, completing a course of four years. He then took a competitive examination and received an appointment on the staff of Dr. Dudley P. Allen's surgical service at Lakeside hospital in Cleveland where he remained for eighteen months. After this service he spent some time in the lying in hospital at New York and then came to Ravenna where he established himself in private practice and became associated with the surgical work at the White bospital.

From a small beginning his private prom a small beginning his private practice grew rapidly and his ability as a general practitioner and surgeon was fast coming to be recognized in this village and throughout the county. But feeling that the field of the country doctor did not offer the opportunities for service that he desired in the spring of this year he went to Washington, D. O.; where he took a post graduate course in general medicine. At the close of the summer term he, with five others, participated in a competitive examination for appointment to the United States navy and he was the only one of the six to meet the test successfully. Returning to Raveuna he waited two weeks for his assignment which came about one month ago and he was appointed to the hospital service of the United States payy at Mare Island, off San Francisco, as assistant surgeon with the rank of first lieutenant.

Dr. Shepard was married about four years ago to Miss Gail Daniels of Gar-rettsville who accompanied her hus-band to California.

In writing of his new field of labor Dr. Shepard says: "It is rather difficult to give a description of this place (Mare Island) so that you can think of it as it is. The first time I fully realized that I was in a different part of the country was after we reached

the island and were walking up to the hospital and began to see large palm trees. The island is about 14 miles long and about 2 miles wide and located in the straits where the Sacramento river empties into the bay. It is about 28 miles from San Francis-It is about 28 miles from San Francisco and about two hours ride from San Francisco on the boat. Mare Island is a large naval station. I don't know how many people are stationed here. Vallejo is a town of about 10,000 just across the river which is a commercial town with no manufacturing and lives off from the naval people stationed on the island. The naval hospital is about a mile from the nav hospital is about a mile from the navy yard. It is a large three story building, built in 1898. We have accommodation for about 300 patients. There are four large wards and private rooms for sick officers. There is asio a large operating room and a fine laboratory. There is also an isolation building used for contagious diseases which is about one-fourth mile from the hospital, and a camp of tents for tuberculosis patients. I have two wards each with eighteen beds. I have about twenty-five now; none that are very sick. I got seven new ones yesterday which came in a transport from the Philippines. There are four medical officers stationed are four medical officers stationed here, three beside myself, Dr. Persons, medical director. Dr. Odell. rank of surgeon, Dr. Pike, rank of passed assistant surgeon, and myself. Dr. Persons has been in the service thirty-six years and will retire in five more years. His first duty was here at Mare Island when he entered the service. The hospital stands back on a slope from the river and is sur-rounded by large eucalyptus trees."

Mrs. Shepard in writing of the trip across the country and her impressions of the west says: "The crossing of Great Salt Lake was certainly an ex-Great Salt Lake was certainly an experience and to tell the truth I was just a little bit scared. The engineer ran very slowly, but imagine being out in the middle of a lake on a train running over a frail looking bridge and no land in sight. It seemed as though we never would get across. I think it took at least two hours to gross. And then came the Great And then came the American Desert. Of all the desola-tion you can possibly imagine it is the worst. For miles and miles nothing in sight but alkali desert with only sage brush for vegetation. It took the rest of the night and part of the next day to cross it. That took as pretty well into Nevada when we got a more hilly country, still alkali and sage brush. The Rockies are just rocky, barren mountains with just rocky, barren mountains with just sage brush vegetation and not remarkable for scenery. The lovely scenery commences when you get into the Sierras. But first I want to tell you about our stop at Humboldt. The train stopped five minutes for water I stayed in the observation car not thinking they would make so long a stop. The doctor got off and went inside the hotel. That is all there is here. It is not used for a hotel now, but for a telegraph station, but there but for a telegraph station, but there it stood, the same old Homboldt House that my father loved so well and where he spent so many of the early years of his life. "Scon after leaving Humboldt the beautiful scenery commenced. I can't describe it; to try to would spoil it all. But I can say that if one could not be satisfied with our own country

after crossing the Sierra Nevada Mountains he would be bard to please. About 8 o'clock we reached the sum. About 8 o'clock we reached the summit of the mountains, 8,000 feet elevation. Then came 40 miles of snow sheds. We got into Oakland at 12:30 a. m. and later took the ferry across the bay to San Francisco. We just missed the Mare Island boat and so had a wait of two hours. We improved the time by strolling around. The city shows the ravages of the earthquake and fire so much. They are building it up, but we saw many are building it up, but we saw many evidences of the earthquake. It must have been a horrible experience. It have been a horrible experience. It took us two hours to come across the bay to Mare Island. I haven't seen much of the island yet, only as we walked up to the hospital, a mile from the wharf, but what I did see certainly is lovely. Fine walks and drives, nice officer quarters, beautiful trees, palms, shrubbery and flower trees, palms, shrubbery and flower beds—an ideal place to spend ten months I think."

The following articles are from Scrapbook # 42, various pages, from the Portage County Historical Society Library. The articles appear to be from the Mantua newspaper in 1940-1941. They review news items from 48-50 years earlier, which is 1891-92. This is of interest because of the lack of the 1890 federal census.

The following article is about Ravenna Village Council passing laws in March 1853. The interesting part is the last three paragraphs, which list the changing of street names. This appeared in the Evening Record March 5, 1949. From the files at the PCHS library.

Early Law Required All Males To Work On Streets MAR 5

'Demon Rum' Lost 1853 Battle With First Ravenna Council

On a momentous day in March, 1853, the first duly-elected council of the village of Ravenna met to consider the affairs of a municipality.

There were momentous decisions @ to be made regulating the citizens of a newly-incorporated village.

In 1-2-3 order, the village fathers provided for the election of certain village officials, regulated exhibitions of public shows and prohibited the sale of liquor in Ravenna.

All of which proves that styles may change but the frailities of man are ever present.

The first ordinances passed in Ravenna are still legible - preserved in a ledger now kept in a cabinet in the city hall. The phrasing, written in flowing Spencerian script, is no different from that still used today.

In future meetings, the pioneer village law-makers took up the problems of keeping streets in repair, prohibiting the use of firearms, including firecrackers and organizing a fire dpartment.

Prohibition evidently was not a success even in those early days because the whole idea was given up 10 years later.

But No. 3 ordinance was passed "to provide for the safety, preserve the health, promote the prosperity and improve the morals, or der, was permissible

comfort and convenience of inhabitants of the village of Ravenna.'

It allowed liquor to be sold or given away only for medicinal or mechanical purposes. Fines ranged from \$15 and costs to \$100 and 10 days in jail for a third offense.

Persons found intoxicated were to be confined to jail and would be freed if they told who had given them the intoxicant. If they refused to give that information, they were to be fined \$10.

The fourth ordinance village books prohibited ale and porter shops and houses or places for "significant or habitual resort

for tippling and intemperance."

The ordinance prohibiting use of firearms in the village in-cluded a provision against fire-Howcrackers. ever in 1863, understanding council agreed that lightfirecrackers ing

on the Fourth of July.

They ruled that all able - bodied between males 21 and 55 who resided the in village or in the vicinity just outside the limits would be required to perform two days' labor each year on the streets and alleys.

Should some man decide he'd

rather not, the councilmen decreed that he might pay \$3 so that someone else could be hired in his place.

Ravenna's very first ordinance provides for the election of a marshal, a treasurer and a street commissioner. The marshal was the law enforcement officer in the village.

The treasurer was to get a two per cent commission on all money

he disbursed, while the street commissioner was to be paid one dollar for each day he actually spent in his official capacity.

Later councils took compassion on him and in 1863 raised the pay to \$1.50 a day. Two years later he was making \$2 a day.

First resolution adopted by the new village council provided that a corporate election for municipal offices in 1853 be held in the office of Dr. W. Pratt in Seymour's block.

The next set the tax rate to defray general expenses at one and one-half mills of each dollar on all taxable real and personal property.

Ravenna's main business streets were renamed in December, 1853. Until that time, Main st. had been known as State st.

West st. was changed to Meridian, North st. to Cedar, East st. to Prospect and South st. to Spruce.

The councilmen also gave names to several of the new streets in the village. These included Oak, now called Riddle av., Sycamore, Bowery, now known as Highland, Day, Walnut, Elm, Pratt, Mill and Cleveland ave.
